President's Message and News of the Association

Let me begin by wishing you all a happy and productive Nowruz 1386/2007.

I offer apologies to those of you who faithfully attended the announced joint ASPS-ISIS reception at the MESA meeting in Boston only to be subjected to one grueling report and financial statement after another and then having to leave without food and refreshments. There was a fundamental misunderstanding about what a reception meant, and the responsibility for not clearing the details was entirely mine, though the then ISIS President, Janet Afari, and Treasurer Secretary, Hamid Akbari, have also asked me to convey their apologies. We will make up for it with a sumptuous reception at McGill's Institute

for Islamic Studies in Montreal at the next MESA meeting in November. Look for further details in the September 2007 Newsletter.

My apologies also for the inconvenience caused by the postponement of our convention in Lahore, which was made inevitable by the fact that part of the financial support we had counted on was not forthcoming. ASPS had been unique among the existing professional associations for having covered all the expenses of virtually all the participants in the first two biennial conventions in Dushanbe and Yerevan, but we may not be able to do so in the future. But again, I hope to make up for the postponement by a grand convention in Tiflis, Georgia, June 8-11, 2007, for which we have had a much larger expression of interest to participate from our members and other scholars from all over the world.

Finally, let me apologize for the delay in the appearance of *Studies on Persianate Societies*, 3, which is still in press at the time of this writing but should be on its way to you very soon. As you can read in a separate column, however, we have signed a contract with Brill to publish it under the new name of the *Journal of Persianate Studies* as a regular academic journal in two issues a year.

And there is more news on the bright side. Our Travel Fellowship Program supported six participants at the World Congress of Sociology, Durban, South Africa, from Iran in July 2006. Another travel Fellowship grant, thanks to the incredibly careful management of Farhad Hakimzadeh, Chief Executive of the Iranian Heritage Foundation, was stretched to support no less than eleven scholars from Iran the Caucasus and Russia at the Sixth Biennial Conference of Iranian Studies in August 2006. We also had three very well attended sponsored sessions at the MESA convention in Boston: "Reforming Iran's Theocratic State" (organized by Mehrzad Boroujerdi, Nov. 19), "Safavid Political and Popular Culture" (organized by Rosemary Stanfield-Johnson, Nov. 20) and "Persianate Political Thought" (organized by S.A. Arjomand, Nov. 20). The grant for our Travel Fellowship Program continues in its second year, and we have every hope of replenishing our Central Eurasia Research Fund (CERF). Let me end by saying that we have several pending new initiatives and a major grant application, but I would rather share them with you when they become definitive.

Elections

Board of Directors

Pursuant to an amendment to the ASPS bylaws, the Board of Directors shall consist of a number of voting members: The President, Immediate Past-President, Secretary-Treasurer, five at-large members and one student member. The Board of Directors shall also include ex-officio members, consisting of the ASPS Newsletter Editor and directors of regular ASPS programs, including the Central Eurasia Research Fund (CERF) and the Travel Fellowship Program, and any other such programs as shall be added to ASPS's agenda in the future.

Dr. Jo-Ann Gross has been elected to continue to serve on the ASPS Board of Directors for 2007-2009. Jo-Ann is Professor of History and Chair of the History Department at The College of New Jersey. The focus of her research is the social history of early modern Iran and Central Asia, with an emphasis on the religious, sociopolitical, and economic aspects of Sufism, popular religious figures, and shrines. She currently serves on the Editorial Board of Studies on Persianate Societies and The Central Eurasian Reader, on the Board of Directors of The Association for the Study of Persianate Societies, and as an institutional representative on the Board of Directors of the American Institute of Afghan Studies. She has served as Secretary-Treasurer of ASPS (1999-2002), as a member of the Editorial Board of the International Journal of Middle East Studies (1996-2000), and as Executive Secretary for the Society for Iranian Studies (1987-90). Her publications include numerous articles and three books, Musul'manskaya Tsentral'naya Aziya: Religioznost' i Obshchestvo-Izbrannye Stat'i (Islamic Central Asia: Religiosity and Society - Collected Works), Russian translation and critical introduction by Lola Dodkhoudoeva (Dushanbe, 2004), a collection of the author's published works on the history of Sufism in Central Asia, two of which were updated for the book; The Letters of Khwaja 'Ubayd Allah Ahrar and His Associates (co-authored with Asom Urunbaev (Brill Publishers, 2002), a collaborative project supported by a 2-year Collaborative Research Grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities; and the editor of Muslims in Central Asia: Expressions of Identity and Change (Duke University Press, 1992). She is currently working on a book project entitled Mapping the Sacred Landscape: The Islamic Shrines of Tajikistan.

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Mirjam Künkler, a Ph.D. Candidate in Political Science, Columbia University is the first student to be elected to the ASPS board of directors.

Mirjam's research interests include comparative state-religion relations, comparative politics of democratization, religious institutions in political transformation processes, politics of resistance and repression, social science methodologies.

She is completing her dissertation titled "When Islamic Intellectuals Advocate Democratic Change: Repression and Toleration in Post-Khomeini Iran and New Order Indonesia", which deals with patterns of repression against Islamic and secular

dissidents in Iran (1989-2004) and Indonesia (1974-1998), and their implications for political transformation processes in both societies. She has published and presented conference papers on the women's press in Iran, post-Khomeini factional politics, the demise of the reform movement, and the 2005 presidential elections.

Mirjam spent the fall semester of 2003 at the Faculty of Social Science of the University of Tehran, Iran, and the summer, fall and part of the spring semester of 2005/2006 at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, the Freedom Institute, and the Indonesian Institute for Public Policy, all in Jakarta. She was the organizer of the Conference "Democracy-Promotion, Rights and Religion" – examining what civic roles religious institutions can play in political transformation processes -- held in Villigst, Germany, August 21-25, 2006, and the coorganizer (with Syafiq Hasyim) of the Workshop 'Women's Rights Advocacy, Islam and the Public Sphere', sponsored by the International Center for Islam and Pluralism (ICIP), Jakarta, held in Cipasung, Indonesia, February 12-16, 2007.

Mirjam is a graduate fellow at the Institute for Social and Economic Research and Policy (ISERP) and the Deputy Director of the newly established Center for the Study of Democracy, Toleration and Religion at Columbia University. She is also the organizer of the 2006/2007 Religion and Democracy Seminar Series.

ASPS welcomes Mirjam to the Association and to the Board of Directors.

Journal of Persianate Studies

Because ASPS has strived for regular and timely delivery of its journal, together with a greater reach to the academic community through library subscriptions, two goals that have not been achieved through past and present publishers, we have decided to place our journal in the hands of a new publisher. A contract has been signed with Brill for the publication of a new journal, which will commence in 2008.

The new publication, *Journal of Persianate Studies*, is to be a regular interdisciplinary academic journal for the benefit of ASPS members. It will be published twice a year in two issues of 128 pages each.

A new editorial board is currently being formed, and will hold its first meeting during the third ASPS biennial convention to be held in Tiflis from June 8-11, 2007.

Third ASPS Biennial Convention Tiflis, Georgia 8-11 June 2007

The Third ASPS Biennial Convention, planned for January 2007 in Lahore, was cancelled due to a lack of funding, and because of the ineligibility of some potential participants to obtain a visa.

After months of investigating an alternative location, we finally agreed on Tbilisi (Tiflis), the capital of the Republic of Georgia, as the host city of our Third Biennial Convention. The Convention will be held at the Institute of Oriental Studies, the Georgian Academy of Sciences, and at the Tiflis State University.

The dates of the Convention are from Friday to Monday, 8-11 June 2007, considering that these dates are the best for convenient flights to Tiflis.

The Convention program remains essentially unchanged, with several Georgian colleagues added as session chairs and presenters. If your paper was accepted for the Lahore convention, you are very welcome to present it in Tiflis.

ASPS will provide lodging for those who present papers and will arrange for hotel accommodations for those who choose to stay in a single room in a more upscale hotel than the hotel designated for the conference. As for travel expenses, we expect to provide funding to cover the travel expenses of the participants from the region. We will inform you further on this point as soon as ASPS receives its expected funding. Participants from Western Europe and the United States are expected to cover their own airfare through their institutions.

Tiflis is the capital city of the Republic of Georgia. Independent since 1991, Georgia was a part of the Russian Empire and later the Soviet Union for almost two centuries. During most of the two hundred years before the Russian takeover of 1800, the eastern half of Georgia was under the control, or at least in the orbit, of Persia. Far from being a peripheral part of the Safavid state, Georgia exerted extraordinary influence on Persia's military and bureaucratic order. It did so by way of the thousands of Georgian slaves who were settled in Persia in the course of the 16th and 17th centuries. Nominally converted to Islam, these Safavid subjects subsequently came to occupy the top ranks of the military and administrative establishment. By the end of the 17th century, most high-ranking courtiers and the majority of Persia's provincial governors were of Georgian background, and the Georgians were the only effective military force to fight the Afghan invaders in the early 18th century. There remain several Georgian-speaking villages in Fereydan, east of Isfahan. (At least one scholar from this Perso-Georgian community will be present in the Tiflis convention.) The city of Tiflis also prospered under the Safavids and Oajars as a major town with a sizeable Muslim community and considerable Persian cultural and architectural influence, some of which architectural examples still standing today.

ASPS conventions have added an important dimension to the ASPS mission of providing a forum for scholarly exchange in all Persianate countries and among all scholars who are engaged in scholarship concerning Persianate societies. In Tiflis we again look forward to bringing scholars together for an interdisciplinary academic meeting.

ASPS's first biennial convention took place in Dushanbe, Tajikistan, in September 2002, with the cooperation of the Academy of Sciences of the Republic of Tajikistan, the Rudaki Institute of Language and Literature, and the National Commission of UNESCO, Tajikistan. This very successful and well-publicized four-day scholarly meeting brought together over 80 scholars from thirteen countries to present papers and to discuss a variety of themes on pre-Islamic and Islamic Persianate culture. Our second biennial convention on Iranian Studies, "Society, History and Culture in the Persianate World," was held in Yerevan, Armenia in 2004, and brought together 90 scholars from eighteen countries. The conventions have provided a rare and valued opportunity for scholars from West, Central, and South Asia, Europe and North America to join in an academic dialogue.

Travel to Georgia

Citizens of the EU, US, Canada, Japan and most post-Soviet states (except Russia) do NOT need a visa to enter Georgia.

Iranian citizens can obtain visas upon their arrival at the Tiflis airport, yet it would be perhaps less costly for them to obtain a visa from the Consulate of Georgia in Tehran for approximately \$30.

Citizens of countries where there is no Georgian consulate can obtain visas at the Tiflis airport (for approximately \$50, but it depends on the length of their stay in Georgia).

An official invitation will be provided for those applicants who need it for obtaining a visa and/or funding. An official letter will be sent to you by email upon your request. Please contact Dr. George Sanikidze at gsany@yahoo.com

United Airlines, Continental Airlines, American Airlines, Virgin Atlantic, British Airways, KLM, and Austrian Airlines offer flights from New York to Tiflis with at least one stop (often in London, but also in Munich and Vienna). On occasion, the second leg of the flight is with Airzena Georgian Airlines.

Based on www.travelocity.com, prices currently range from \$1,400 to \$2,000 depending on which week day one chooses to travel. Midweek flights (Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays) are the least expensive, but reasonably priced flights are available on other days, as well.

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The Central Eurasian Studies Society Eighth Annual Conference, 2007, will be held at the University of Washington and will be hosted by the Ellison Center for Russian, East European and Central Asian Studies. Panels begin Friday morning, October 19, and continue through mid-day on Sunday, October 21.

The Commission on the History of Science and Technology in Islamic Societies is pleased to announce a conference in Barcelona, Spain, 11-14 April 2007. Persian: In cooperation with the Division of Eastern Mediterranean Languages, a non-intensive ten-week course in first level Persian at the undergraduate level will be offered in the First and Second Sessions. This course is not open to native speakers of Persian or its varieties.

Second Session (July 10 - August 11): Non-Intensive First Level Persian II

Prerequisite: None. This course is a continuation of Non-Intensive First Level Persian I. Non-Intensive First Level Persian II is a 5-week, 3-credit course designed to build communicative skills as well as proficiency in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. The course is non-intensive and will include the language material normally covered in two consecutive semesters of undergraduate study at the entry level. Materials and activities include conversational tasks, oral presentations, listening to the news, utilizing Persian audiovisual and internet sources. This course is open to under-

graduate and graduate students, and to persons who are not academically affiliated but need knowledge of Persian for professional or other valid reasons. This course is offered for undergraduate credit only. This course is not open to native speakers of Persian or its varieties.
